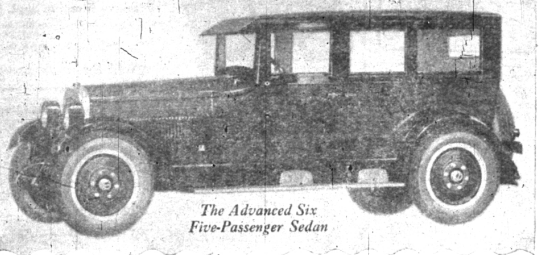

Notice of the Primary Election will be held in the County of Oakland, State of Michigan, at the various voting precincts, on TUESDAY, SEPT. 9, A. D. 1924.

Senatorial.
One candidate for United States Senator to fill vacancy, one candidate for Governor: one candidate for Lieutenant Governor, one candidate for Representative in Congress from the Congressional district of which said Township forms a part.

Legislative.
One candidate for Senator in the State Legislature for the Senatorial District of which said Township forms a part, one candidate for Representative in the State Legislature for the Legislative District of which said Township forms a part.

County.
Also candidates for the following county offices, viz: Judge of Probate, Sheriff, County Clerk, County Treasurer, Register of Deeds, Prosecuting Attorney, Two Circuit Court Commissioners, One County Drain Commissioner, One Surveyor, Two Coroners, One County Road Commissioner.

Delegates to County Conventions.
Sec. 18. There shall also be elected at said primary by direct vote of the registered and qualified voters of each political party in said county as many delegates in each township, ward or precinct as the case may be, as shall be entitled to vote at the election of said political party for the county convention.

Separate Ballots.
SEPARATE BALLOTS for each political party shall be provided. The elector shall name the political party in that year when he votes for a ballot and marking the ballot must make a cross in the square to the left of the name of each candidate for whom he desires to vote and cast vote for only one candidate.

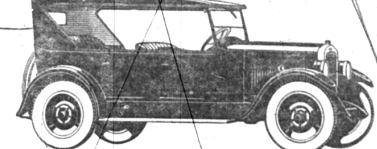

NOTICE
Cutting of Noxious Weeds.
It shall be the duty of the purchaser of highways in each road district to give general notice to the following manager to every owner, possessor or occupier of land and to every person, firm or corporation having charge of any lands in this State, whether owned, leased, occupied or by or through which land a highway passes, to cut and clear such noxious weeds. Four notices, each not less than two feet square shall be posted in each road type and posted one in each of four conspicuous places on the road district. The notices shall also be published in some local newspaper. These notices shall set forth the fact that all noxious weeds shall be cut on or before a certain date which date shall be fixed by the municipality and the publishing of such notices shall take place not less than ten days before the date which the weeds must be cut, and such notice may need to be repeated.
To owners, possessors or occupiers of land, or any person, firm or corporation having charge of any land in this State.
Notice is hereby given that all noxious weeds growing on any lands in the Township of Bloomfield, County of Oakland, or within the boundaries of any road district, and situated on any such lands must be cut down and destroyed on or before the first day of August, A. D. nineteen hundred twenty-four. Failure to comply with this notice on or before the date mentioned or within ten days thereafter shall make the owner or possessor liable for the cost of cutting same and additionally liable if two or more notices of such cost to be levied and collected against the property of the owner or possessor unless same are better and collected.
