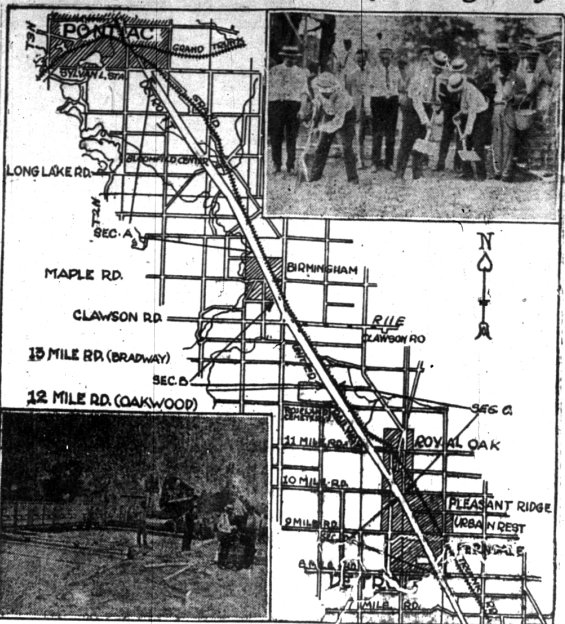


Mr. and Mrs. Emerson Brown moved into their new home on Floyd street early this week. They were formerly located on Purdy street.

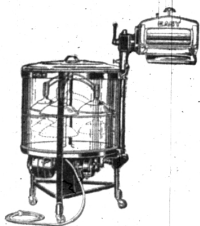

BOARD OF EDUCATION.
Birmingham, Mich., July 28, 1924.
The regular meeting of the Board of Education was held in the office at 8 P. M.

Present: H. B. Clement, R. J. Taylor, Fred V. Quanton and Leigh Lynch.

The minutes of all meetings since the last regular meeting were approved. The following bids were received for \$25,000, 4 1/2% serial, Barnum School Heating and Ventilating Bonds:

Matthew Finn, Par and a Premium of \$14.
First State Bank, Birmingham, Par and a Premium of \$106.
Keane, Higbie and Co., Par and a Premium of \$43.

Whitlessy, McLean and Co., Par and a Premium of \$14.
Moved by Quanton, supported by Lynch that the bid of the First State Bank be accepted. Carried.

Moved by Taylor, supported by Quanton that the following resolution be adopted: Carried.

WHEREAS, at a special election of the qualified electors of School District No. 1, Fractional, Townships of Bloomfield, Troy, Royal Oak and Southfield duly called and held on July 15, 1924 more than a majority of the qualified voters present voted in favor of the proposition of borrowing the sum of \$25,000.00 and issuing the bonds of the School District therefore, for the purpose of building a new heating and ventilating plant at the Barnum school in said district.

IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED, that the bonds of School District No. 1, Fractional, townships of Bloomfield, Troy, Royal Oak and Southfield, in the aggregate sum of \$25,000.00 be issued in accordance with the vote of the electors, for the purpose of building a new heating and ventilating plant at the Barnum school in said district.

RESOLVED, FURTHER, that the president and secretary of the Board of Education sign and execute the said bonds on behalf of the School District, and that said bonds when so executed, be delivered to First State Bank of Birmingham, the purchaser thereof, on payment to the Treasurer of the School District of the purchase price therefor, in accordance with the by-laws thereof, in accordance with the by-laws thereof, which has been accepted.
