With a thousand thanks from a grateful board who reflects the gratitude of the community to the donors of numerous articles that were much needed in the house, the community house board are simultaneously announcing the re-opening of the house and mentioning a short list of other articles that are still needed. The house will be opened early next week. Until the arrival of Miss Mary Griffith, the resident hostess, the last of the month, Mr. Arthur Hartwell will continue her work as hostess.

From pleas garnered through the year of occupancy in the house and with a general idea of what will be required during the next several years, the board has undertaken a series of alterations to meet the new requirements as far as possible. The partitioning has divided the boys' room at the rear of the house and the assembly room has been removed, now a reinforced floor covers the front of the house to the extent of the increasing rooming capacity of from about fifty to approximately one hundred and fifty, gives an additional touch to the room that renders a needed atmosphere of hominess. The lounge room is now for dances and club meetings more efficiently makes making it possible for entertainers to be present on a small scale. One of the chief benefits from the new arrangement is that the Village Players who use the house for its plays during the winter.

The old piano, much needed in the church and will be returned this week. Mrs. T. R. Donovan also ranks high among the donors to the community house. She has taken an active part in remodeling the house, while the cleaning of the house and furnishings came through her financial assistance.

The community board will hold their regular meeting this evening in the house which it is likely the year's changes will be made in the program.

Milk that has been properly pasteurized destroys these germs—and makes a healthy, nutritious food for the children as well as the grown-ups.

## One Percent Penalty Now Due on Village Taxes
