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Ladies Hear Talk By Mrs. Wallace On Child Labor Laws

Local Woman's Literary Club Given First-Hand Knowledge Of Subject

On Tuesday afternoon Mrs. A. D. Wallace, legislative chairman of the Detroit Federation of Women's Clubs, presided at the local Woman's Literary Club on the proposed Child Labor amendment to the national constitution, and gave a review of the national situation in regard to immigration.

She spoke of the situation in our country as a whole, and of the need for five to twelve years of age are employed steadily through the sugar beet season from March until dark, at tasks beyond their strength. She said they work under hygienic and moral conditions which are appalling, oftentimes in defiance of the compulsory school law. She told of the situation in the different states and entered into the legal and political phases.

At the close of her remarks on the subject of the alien immigration into the United States, she summed up by declaring that such immigration should be controlled at the point of embarkation, that it should be regulated by a basis of quantity as well as quality, and should be preferably 2 percent on the basis of the 1890 census rather than 3 percent on a basis of the 1910 census. The present law expires June 30, 1924.
