The Oakland County Normal will be run in conjunction with the Pontiac City Schools and be housed in one of the schools of that city under the direction of Superintendent Harris. It will consist of two rooms and the necessary practice quarters. The normal room proper where the student teachers will be located will be under the direction of the principal of the Normal. One-fourth of the amount of money which the state for the 4.79 acres of land tracting on Woodward Avenue was awarded Dr. Leo Breischer of Detroit and Bloomfield Hills, when the three commissioners appointed by the state to hear the condemnation proceedings submitted their findings in Pontiac last week. Although Dr. Breischer held his property worth about \$200,000.00, the award specified the sum of \$4,864.75. The property is situated on both sides of Woodward Avenue, just north of the Liberty estate at Hickory Grove road.

The commissioners who handled the case were Sylvester Pheny, Ed. Henry, E. Noble of Oxford, and Edward G. Ortonville. Dr. Breischer is one of several that must be disposed of in order to secure the right-of-way for the Detroit-Pontiac road. It indicates that other property owners who are holding out for big sums of money in such accounts which in many instances have been larger than that awarded Dr. Breischer.
