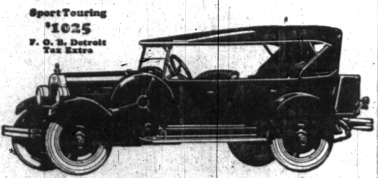

2361 Two New Records by Caruso

Something of mingled regret and pleasure strikes us at hearing two new records by Caruso; regret that the great tenor no longer lives in person, pleasure that we can still hear him through records such as these. His latest are two Neapolitan songs that rivally recall the great tenor's world-known melody by Paul Dresser has been selected by the Hoosiers for their official song.
