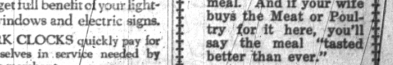

KNIGHTS AND SISTERS TO HOLD THEATRE PARTY

Formerly the annual theatre party in the Knights of the Northern Spy is left out as it requires a longer term of years to come into bearing. Where only a few trees can be accommodated the summer and fall varieties should be used.

The winter varieties can keep longer and can often be purchased cheaper than they can be raised in a small orchard.

These—Clary, Favorite, Bartlett, Flemish Beauty, Sheldon.

Plums—Burbank, Bradshaw, Lombard, Moore, Diamond, Shropshire, Damsen.

Peach—Yellow St. John (first yellow peach), Carmen (most beautiful), New Profic, Kalamazoo, Late Crawford, Smock. The last four varieties are best for canning.

Cherry—Early Richmond, Montmorency. Above varieties are best for canning, the latter best for eating.

The Sweet Cherries are rather tender, very subject to Brown Rot and are generally harvested by the birds before they are ripe enough to pick.

Largely follow: Black Tartarian, dark red; Bing, dark; Windsor, dark; Napoleon, light; Gov. Wood, light.

Again it may be repeated that the Sour Cherry is the best for a limited area, as the tree does not attain a large diameter as most other fruit trees. It is a handsome shade tree of small stature, striking in both flower and fruit, and requires the minimum spraying to produce good results.

A study of the varieties of fruit for commercial orchards involves a weighing of the size of crops, value of fruit when produced, and the amount of care necessary to produce a staged amount of fruit.
