### PLANS TO DRIVE FOR BIG WHEELS

To Seek Funds From Entire Village To Sustain the Project  
PUT MEN ON BOARD  
Committee Feels That House Has Become Definite Need Here

The Community House committee, preceding the opening of a membership campaign, announces the appointment of a men's advisory committee to assist the present committee of Birmingham women in directing affairs at the Community House. The new committee consists of Thomas Cobb, vice-president and cashier of the First State Savings Bank; E. G. Wasey, lawyer; Clarence W. Hart, superintendent of schools; Earl Potter, principal of Highland Park high school; and Charles Bingham, president of the Exchange Club and member of the village committee.

It was felt by the committee of seven women who have sponsored the enterprise during the year that their group was too small to undertake all of the responsibility, and also that there were no arrangements in which the advice of a body of men would be especially helpful, for instance, with financial matters and in helping with the boys' activities.

The board at present consists of seven members chosen from the town at large, and is as representative as possible. During the past year the Community House has been on trial in a manner, to prove its need, and so concerted attempt has been made to secure support from the town at large. The work has been carried on through voluntary contributions and money raised by special sales and entertainments.

The committee feels that the Community House during the past year has proved its worth to Birmingham, and is justified in continuing its operation. So it is commencing a drive for memberships which will support it during the coming year, there will be two classes of members, the active and the sustaining.

The members enrolled in this campaign will have the privilege of voting upon representatives for both the committee and the men's advisory board.

"Since it is the purpose of the Community House to serve the needs of all people and answer a variety of needs in this town, it is hoped that the membership will be as general as possible, and that the membership will represent all sections of the town," said John H. Marlotte, president of the committee.

"It is hoped also that the campaign will be of value in advertising the services which the Community House has to offer, and so increase its usefulness, as well as raise the funds necessary for its upkeep," continued Mrs. Marlotte.

The recreational services offered by the house are considered by the committee as one of the most important by the committee. There is no other public indoor center where children and young people are apt to expose themselves to dangers by playing in the streets during the afternoon and evening hours.

There is a Camp Fire group for the girls and a Blue Bird auxiliary for the girls. The boys' club is also very much interested in a camp which is held once a week.

More attention is being given to the boys' activities this year, and it is hoped to attract the attention of some of the older men of the town, who could direct scout work or a boys' club. It was formerly used as a fire house and is being converted into a recreation center.

The rent money amounted to \$400 for the past year and was used for paying the general expenses. The cost of raising the house for the past year was approximately \$2,500. The main items being directory ad and janitor service, provisions, entertainment, and purchase of furniture.

Assuming that the expenses for next year will be about the same, it will be necessary, therefore, to raise \$1,500 through the membership campaign.
