## WE HEARD IT SAID BY

(Little Editorials picked up by the Staff in and around Birmingham.)

### Ree Humphrey, of the Leinbach-Humphrey Company:

"At present we have plans under way that, when they are completed will mean the spending of \$200,000 in Eco City to take place this spring. This money will be spent by the Leinbach-Humphrey Company and will be used to a great extent, for the beautifying of the subdivisions. One of the projects is undertaken in the equipping of a playground on the site given to the people by the Company. This site is designated by the permanent Christmas trees placed there during the holidays. One of these will be as modern as any in Detroit and a trained woman will be employed on Saturdays to act as supervisor and will be maintained by our Company."

### W. E. Barton, Ruffner avenue, Eco City, President of the Arnold Civic Association of Eco:

"In our request to Birmingham for a school in our subdivision we feel that we are making no undue demands. We are rapidly growing here and we now have nearly three hundred children of the school age, and we are in dire need of a school to accommodate them. We are willing to have the school placed on the extreme west end of the subdivision so that it will in time take care of the children from the subdivisions that are springing up to the west of us. For years the farm owned by Harold Emmons and where Eco now stands yielded school taxes to the village of Birmingham with no reward and we now feel that the time has come when Birmingham owes us this school. We bring a great proportion of business to Birmingham, for instance there is just \$5000 worth of coal that I know of that has been purchased there this winter and this is only one small necessity. There are dozens more that I could name."

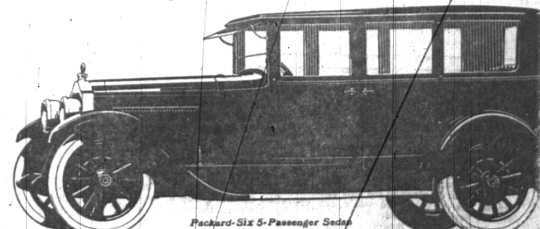
