THIRTY YEARS AGO

Eggs were three dozen for 25 cents, butter 19 cents per pound, milk was 6 cents a quart; the butcher gave away liver and treated the kids with Bologna; the hired girl received \$2 a week and did the washing; women did not powder or paint (in public), smoke, or play poker, or shake the shimmy. Men wore white shirts and coats, chewed tobacco, spit out the sidewalk, and cussed. Beer was 5 cents a quart, and the lunch laborers worked ten hours a day and never went on a strike. No tips were given to waiters and the hair check graft was unknown. A kerosene hanging lamp and a stereoscope in the parlor were luxuries. No one was ever operated on for appendicitis, gonorrhea, glands, Meckel's diverticulum, or folks lived to a good age and were happy even then.

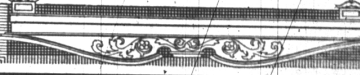
