RELATIVE MORALITY

Our conventional ideas of morality would be absolutely ludicrous if they were not so absolutely tragic. That is a bold statement, but let us for purposes of illustration,

suppose a case of not uncommon occurrance:

A young man, apparently a "fine fellow," a church
worker, called a "model boy" by all his teachers, liked
and respected by all who knew him, commits a highway robbery and is sentenced to a term in prison. Immediately robbery and is sentenced to a term in prison. Immediately he becomes a social outcast and his former friends speak of him in shocked whispers as if he were guilty of all the crimes of Nero. But what was his offense? He took money that wasn't listed among his own belongings. Why? Perhaps he himself does not know. It may have been the impulse of an unguarded moment; the reaction of rejected affections, that "fatal slope down which the formest and publist are drawn as well as the weakest and of rejected affections, that "ratal slope down which the firmest and noblest are drawn as well as the weakest and most vicious, and at the bottom of which lies one of two pits: suicide or crime." Or it may have been deliberately planned and cold-bloodedly executed. But regardless of all this, isn't he still a human being? We place him on the moral black-list for stealing a few dollars; but we do not ostracise people for stealing our time, blackening our conductions rabbing us of our joy; in performance or for

not ostracise people for stealing our time, blackening our good name, robbing us of our joy in performance or for destroying our budding ambitions. What the legal code may require is one thing, but morality is something clae.

Most of us are thieves in one sense or another, and from a moral viewpoint the theft of money is not the greatest of robberies. Yet when a man is most in need of friends to aid him in recovering his lost balance, to show him that men are not his enemies, and to prove to him that his life is worth salvaging and that mistakes can be rectified, is the precise moment that they fail him. Oh, sweet Christian morality! morality!

Material possessions, when destroyed by fire, flood or calamity, are salvaged and reclaimed by mankind. Isn't a soul far richer than a piece of wood or iron?
