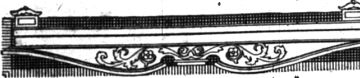

about "a warless world." The out-lawry of war is a frequently used expression. Two great religious bodies in annual assembly have recently put themselves on record not only as against war, but in favor of every movement which can legitimately reduce armament. In Congress there is the introduction of a great many of such plans for "World Courts," "Associations of Nations," and "Disarmament Conferences." Let them come. They are tendencies. There are good and bad among them. But they are all in the right direction. It shows we are thinking. That the people are talking. Eventually the right plan will be found.

But after all, is not this failure of a great many of our people to properly observe, to observe some way, Memorial Day, their indifference to its real meaning and purpose, simply an illustration, an indication, of that same indifference shown in so many ways to consider "worth living for," what so many have considered "worth dying for?" Take an average question of interest, not only in the nation, but in any average community, our own for example. Instantly there are not only those who favor and approve it, but those who criticize. But when action is called for, the numbers in both classes quickly diminish. Marked indifference and apathy quickly develop on the part of many. So that that which should have enlisted the support or opposition of the masses is left to a few. As we are therefore considering earnestly everything that has to do with the "warless world," we must with equal earnestness not lose sight of an adequate protection for ourselves and our people until a solution is reached. Let us not lose sight of the fact that there are foes on the inside to be guarded against, as well as on the outside. That these need to be dismissed as well as others. And until they are, that an adequate protection against them be maintained.

Not only are there the forces of Bolshevism and Anarchists on the outside, but there is Bolshevism and Anarchy on the inside. There is the anarchy of Lawlessness. For whenever law is over-ridden or violated, there is anarchy. And where there is general indifference and apathy on the part of the people, there is Bolshevism. Ever let the spirit of disloyalty and disobedience have sway, and law soon goes. And where law goes, the government soon goes with it.

America does not believe in revolution. The old soldier never desires war. His is the peace spirit. He knows what war is. We have other means at hand. It has been said: "The pen is mightier than the sword." But in America the ballot can, and may be, may be, the mightiest sort of weapon. We elect our representatives in the government, let them take care of the war. We have no right to be misrepresented. If they do not do what we like, let's elect them. This is equally so in nation, state, or municipality. It is true from the most exalted office in the land to the lowest in the smallest community. There is redress.

"Every day," said Goethe, "is a vessel into which a great deal may be poured, if we will actually fill it up." (Cato's maxim) "If you mean as a sincere man, why may not every one of us be a hero?" I saw a fine motto the other day. It read: "Wisdom is knowing what to do next. Skill is knowing how to do it. Virtue is doing it." So let's keep the day—a memory to the dead; an honor to the living; a reminder to ourselves.

ONE MAD DOG SHOT DURING PAST WEEK

The police were called upon this week to shoot the first mad dog reported in this community. The dog was the property of A. E. Sharp of Bird avenue, Eco City. The dog, an airlead, was about five years old and would not submit to be muzzled. He had been tied at the rear of the Sharpe house for about a week. He showed no signs of rabies on Monday, and early Tuesday Chief of Police Anderson was called and shot the animal, who he later learned by its actions that it was mad.

Two unmuzzled dogs were shot by the police last week when they were picked up in the business section. They were unclaimed. The dog, which two weeks ago bit five year old John Davis, on the Adams school grounds, is still being watched by the police for any signs of rabies, but the animal appears perfectly normal and no fear is being held for the child.

The three members have spent many evenings going over the roll, as well. "We have had a great many taxpayers come in to see us about their 1924 tax assessment," said Mr. McClellan this week, "and this leaves that this year they have had a better knowledge of real estate valuation. This has been a very fair year for the taxpayer, and we have with every property owner. Many assessments have been raised. Some have been lowered, and we have, in no doubt, paid personal visits to numbers of properties." The total assessed valuation of Birmingham property has not been tabulated; neither has the tax rate been fixed, although it is believed that the rate for 1924 will be \$13.00 or less per thousand dollars of assessed valuation.



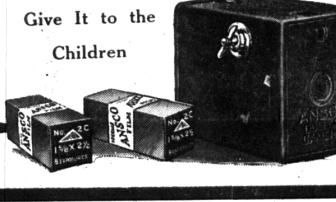

Local Girl Wins First Prize In Typing Contest

Miss Betty Harrington of Daines street won third place in the state inter-scholastic shorthand and typing contest held at Western State Normal, Kalamazoo, Friday of last week. This class was given 15 minutes of plain copy to do. Miss Betty typed a set of 864 words, which was an average of 57.6 words per minute. 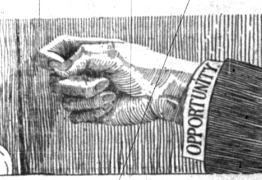
