WE HEARD IT SAID BY

(Little Editorials picked up by the Staff in and around Birmingham.)

Mrs. R. B. Hewitt, Oakland avenue: "At the Woman's Club Monday tea was served. With it were served some cookies which were from a recipe published in the Eccentric some time ago. They were very delicious and I am going to get the recipe for myself."

Mrs. Iva Marlette, Pierce street: "The activities, which have been started at the Community house this year will be carried on in the future by volunteer help as far as possible, leaving the resident directors free to organize new work, and offer further service to the public through the house."

Mr. George T. Hendrie, Bloomfield Hills: "The real estate transactions that are going on now, I do not hear anything of towns and cities buying up land to use for public parks and playgrounds. In London, England, you can walk for five miles through the center of the city on what they call the 'country walks.' Here we are reserving no parks for the crowded districts."

Luther D. Allen, Bloomfield township supervisor: "There is great inequality in the amount of taxes between the districts in one township even, and the difference between northern parts of the state and the more populous districts is greater still. A recent speaker at the meeting of the county board of supervisors advocated that schools should be taxed and paid for by county units at least, and not the school district units that are now employed."

W. E. Barton, president of the Eco City Civic Association: "In my opinion, after carefully looking into the matter, the school system on the property lying outside of the square mile of Birmingham should be cared for all the expenses of the entire school system. It looks to me as though Birmingham, by locating her children at the expense of the outlying districts and was still unwilling to relieve their strains."

J. Bert Peabody, East Maple avenue: "I would like to have every man in Birmingham and Bloomfield township do his part in creating in fishing, to be present at the banquet of the Oakland County Sportsmen's Association in Pontiac Tuesday, May 15, and there is a strong movement on this association to replant all Oakland county lakes with fish, and should be encouraged. If this could be accomplished, we would be in a regular fishing center."

Charles J. Shain, village president: "I favor the licensing of all persons who desire to build sidewalks in Birmingham. It is just as necessary, in my opinion, to license them as it is to license truck drivers. We should have bonds filed to cover guaranteed specifications and requirements on all public improvements."

Mrs. Katherine F. Mann, Greenwood avenue, chairman: "The P. T. A. of the Baldwin high school wishes to thank those who so heartily cooperated with us in the recent newspaper drive and a special vote of thanks to Mr. McCormack, who donated his truck and services in the collection of papers; to Mr. Porteous who so kindly helped us and to Mr. Whalen who loaned his machine for all kinds of work. The results of this drive, were gratifying and those who worked, learned a great lesson, that of keeping papers and magazines tied. The Unit has voted this, as a permanent means of raising money and asks that everyone interested in the Parent-Teacher work in the High School will, please, save your newspapers and magazines."

E. Meeker, local expressman: "There should be a penalty on thoughtless people who turn alarms for small grass fires. Every time the fire department is called out it costs the town about \$30, at least, and this is a needless waste in the case of many grass fires, which are harmless."
