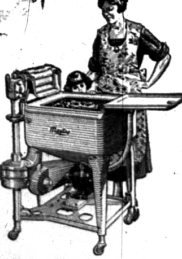

improvement taxes, \$25; county road tax, \$7.75; county Court road tax, \$1.05. This total rate of \$23.07 applies to all property in this school district, and to which \$1.50 will be added to the property in this school district, outside of Birmingham for township road repair tax.

"I think a great deal of education, and that's the reason that the school tax this year amounts to \$17.57, or 61 percent of the total winter taxes," went on Mr. Barton. "Of course, in the last analysis, the rate this year, though lower than a year ago, will exact more money from your pocket-book because the assessed valuation of Birmingham Township, along with other parts of Oakland county and the state of Michigan, were boosted by the state tax commission last spring. "Officials of Birmingham Township are now busy preparing the tax receipts; they assure me that I may be able to collect taxes here by December 10. From December 10 to January 10, I will add a penalty of one per cent for collection expense; after that date, I will have to have four per cent for special purposes. BARTON AWARDED \$4500.00 DAMAGES

Several unusual aspects were brought out in the \$20,000 damage suit of W. S. Barton of Eco City, against three defendants charged with contributing to the cause of an accident last February that resulted in serious injury to Mr. Barton and the wrecking of his automobile. Following the accident Mr. Barton was in the hospital for three months and did not entirely recover until the middle of the summer. His loss was almost totally disabling.

limited supply of not more than two or three hundred gallons of water per minute, but this is more or less doubtful and in any event would not materially affect the water supply. Under these conditions it is obvious that the village must secure an additional source of supply sufficient to provide for its needs until such a time as a supply is available from the Great Lakes.

For, let it be remembered, no municipality is allowed to go beyond its own boundaries to secure a water supply, unless it wants to face a damage suit—a thing that Birmingham did several years ago when a test well on the Latham farm cost local taxpayers over \$6,000.00.

The logical thing to do, it is to annex lands to Birmingham that contain a larger underground supply of water.
