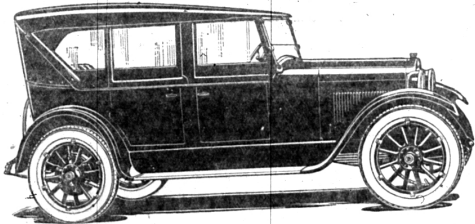

Nash Motors Sets October Record

October set a new high sales record for The Nash Motor Company, Kenosha, Wisconsin. Closing of books for the month revealed that the total dollar volume of business transacted bulked substantially larger than the best month heretofore in the history of the institution. In making public this statement E. H. McCarthy, Nash General Sales Manager said, "The bare statement that October was the biggest month record by Nash since the formation of the company is incomplete, of course, but at this unprecedented sales condition takes on added importance when you contrast it with the general condition prevailing throughout the industry. It is no secret that business on the part of automobile companies is nothing more than fair. Furthermore, you must take into consideration the fact that the fall season normally is never the most active sales period. And a further resistance to the prevailing national attitude of waiting rather than buying during a presidential election year. Nevertheless, the demand for the new Nash Advanced Six and Special Six models has grown so rapidly since the day the cars were first placed on an exhibition throughout the country that we were not oversold. Added evidence as to this is found in reports from dealers which show that in 15 other states at the end of October, the bonafide unfilled retail orders for new Nash models, specifically the new Nash models, totaled 126,000 cars.

"An analysis of the proportionate sales of closed car sales during October shows an interesting insight into the situation. October closed car business was the biggest ever over here. And the October total for the performance of closed car sales will pass the combined enclosed car sales of the three next largest months in the history of Nash.

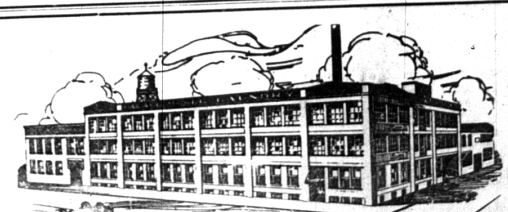
