MRS. ELLEN C. BENEDICT TELLS OF 66 YEARS AGO

"Wider Woodward avenue" has brought about many drastic changes and each new change causes the "old folks" to reminisce about what was here and what was there "in my day". Never has an elastic imagination been so important as in visioning the day when Woodward avenue was an old Indian Trail, or when Indians were roving our Bloomfield Hills.

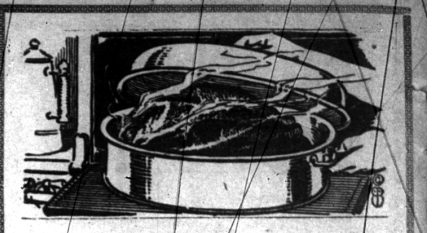
Next are three volumes by Clara Louise Burdick, "The Right Track", "Jewel" and "Jewel's Story Book". Each book is a helpful one.
