THE VILLAGE OF BIRMINGHAM ORDINANCE NO. 112 of the Village of Birmingham be and is hereby amended by the addition of paragraphs (1) (b) and (1) (c) as follows and that Paragraph (1) (a) as follows:

Section Four—Service Pipe (a) The location of service pipe in the public streets of alloys shall be marked by a lamping dry material in lay surface except for a trench which is higher than the surrounding and slightly above the surface of the street. All excavations shall be entirely removed from the street.

(b) The location of service pipe shall be entirely removed for backfilling. Filling shall use suitable material hauled in for the purpose.

(c) Tunneling under streets will not be permitted unless by special permission. When tunneling appears to be expedient, open cuts shall be made in both grade and paved streets where necessary and excavations made by boring shall not be made.

(d) The repairing and maintenance of sidewalks, where holes or trenches have been placed, shall be done by the Village but the schedule hereinafter provided.

Section Five—Application for Service Connection (a) No person shall be granted the use of a sewer for a building or other structure in accordance with the following schedule: (1) For a service on unpaved streets \$25 (2) For a service on paved streets \$25 (3) For a service on streets where the water makes necessary, outside cost of re-laying the sidewalk surface.
