For the first time functioning through the period of a Presidential campaign, the Women's Civic League have taken an active part so long as the movement to bring every registered voter to the polls. Thirteen signs which read "Vote As You Please. But Vote" were placed in windows of local business places, as reminders. Five hundred little tags were also printed under the direction of the members of the Civic League to read "I Will Vote" upon one side, and upon the other side, "I Have Voted. Have You?" These were given to voters in the village after they had cast their ballots.

Members of the Civic League assume the well deserved credit of assisting in bringing the largest number of voters to the polls that have ever voted at an election in the village. This is the first Presidential election that the Civic League have been an active body, having formed only little over a year ago.

Y. W. C. A. WORKER TELLS OF WOMEN IN NEAR EAST

Miss Ruth Woodsmall, for several years in charge of Y. W. C. A. work in Constantinople, and a worker in the world war, spoke at the community house Sunday evening on "Women of the Near East."

Among the significant movements which are taking place among the women of the Near East is the co-operation in community work of the different nationalities, Greek, Syrian, Turkish and Armenian women and girls working together and learning to understand each other better. Miss Woodsmall said that the better spirit which was being developed through working together was an important factor in bringing about peace to the district and in breaking down racial barriers.

Another change is the growing freedom of the eastern women, which is recognized and encouraged by the Turkish government.

Miss Hilda Trumbull, dressed as a Turkish girl, showed the change in costume of the Turkish women. There were also photographs and costume dolls on display.
