Seek Approval To County Milk Test

Oakland county authorities are making their final campaign this week to obtain votes in support of the proposed county bond issue of \$27,000 to provide for tuberculin testing of cows.

Birmingham has for the past two years had an ordinance requiring that all milk should be from tuberculin tested cows. A letter from the Birmingham health officer, Dr. Arthur W. Newitt, to the Pontiac department of health, testifies to the effectiveness of this work in preventing tuberculosis.

There have been no cases of tuberculosis in children reported to me since this ordinance was passed, whereas before this I have personal knowledge of at least two deaths in Birmingham from tuberculosis directly traceable to infected milk, he writes.
