WE HEARD IT SAID BY

(Little Editorials picked up by the Staff in and around Birmingham.)

W. D. Clark, West Maple avenue:
"It will be a fine thing if the voters approve the proposition to annex the South Boulevard territory to Pontiac, November 4. I can see no real reason why the voters of Bloomfield township should oppose the project. Those who have looked into the matter can see that the only thing which will give the South Boulevard district to be annexed to Pontiac. Those who live in the affected territory ought to vote 'Yes' on the matter. If they know what is best for them they will do so."

R. Eugene Gregg, Willett street:
"Persons who are not informed of the subject of evolution from a scientific standpoint, and who are prejudiced from a religious point of view, but simply want to get the subject of evolution out of the mind of the public, are entitled to be called 'Evolution Baiters.' Mrs. R. B. M. Catechism, president of the Woman's Civic League, at the last meeting of the league on Monday:

George T. Hendrie, of Bloomfield Hills:

The business men of Birmingham have been splendid in responding to our requests and have been among the most generous subscribers. And not only in subscribing has Birmingham responded but they have been splendid in their attendance at the little functions of one kind and another to raise the funds."

Mrs. W. W. Raymond, of Haddon avenue:
"One way of estimating the interest the people are taking and the benefits they derive from the community hospital is through the calls for information on various subjects upon the house. In our ten-day drive a day made to the house, the questions ranging from 'Where could I have my sick dog, shot, please?' to 'Where can I obtain the services of a stenographer?' are estimated to have crossed rapidly since the opening of the house this fall. We are glad to have made to obtain the information which is so valuable to the community. The matter will be more ample."

Charles G. Walker, of South Woodward avenue:
"The condition of part of the pavement on South Woodward avenue, inside the village, is a nuisance to motorists. There are several places in particular that are not only bad from the standpoint of running tires, they are actually dangerous at night. Law and consideration for other motorists urge a cover from being laid over the lights in the village and there is no way of seeing these places until it is too late for them. Some action should be taken by the village to care for these places. They have already raised one tier that I know of."
