New Records this Week

Prince of Wales Speaks on a Record—Dori Sings and Cortot Plays

His father and mother, the King and Queen, have already made records. This week the Prince of Wales takes on the record of "Sportmanship." His presence at that tournament the year of this most popular Heat Appeal. On the reverse of the record the first of H. M. Goldstein's records plays his "own song," "Old Boss the Prince of Wales." The daintiness of Lurenia Dori finds expression in two records by her this week from Argentine and Spanish sources. "Minguetas" (My Little Troubadour) is plaintively melodious, in the tango manner, with some lovely bell counter-tenor. Both songs, in fact, have delicate and elusive dance rhythms. "Le Majo" (Dancer) (The Gallant Lover) being a fine example of the "tonadilla," a popular Spanish dance song, quite different from the tango.

Cortot's two records are piano display numbers, a scherzo by Mendelssohn, and "Bourree" by Saint-Saens. They are swift and difficult, and superb examples of this master's skill at the hammer-like staccato touch. The latter, for the left hand alone, is a magnificent piece of virtuosity.

Murphy in Sentimental Mood

A new record by Lambert Murphy, his first in some time, records very best pieces of harmonization. It is "My Dream Girl," from the musical play of that name, a thing of intense and impassioned beauty. What it is paired "Memory Lane," a popular waltz song.

The good work keeps up of recording and recalling some of the best popular songs of a generation ago. Not fragments, but complete records. This week Peerless Quartet takes up the burden with "Maid the Green Fields of Virginia" and "The Girl I Loved in Sunny Tem-
