**Sweeping Changes In
 All Studebaker Models**

 All of the Studebaker closed bod-
 ies are made by the Studebaker Cor-
 poration in its gigantic new body
 plant, the last of which, costing ten
 million dollars, was finished in 1923.
 It is claimed that these modern plants
 with the very latest modern machin-
 ery are responsible for great savings
 effected in manufacture and this ac-
 counts for the obvious splendid qual-
 ity of Studebaker cars at the prices
 offered—the prices for the closed cars

range from \$1,395 for the Standard
 Six three-passenger Coupe roadster
 to \$2,860 for the Big Six seven-pas-
 senger touring sedan.
Balloon Tires Regular Equipment
 Studebaker was among the very
 first to introduce genuine balloon tires as
 standard equipment. Instead of the
 compression low pressure cord tires
 Studebaker has gone all the way and
 offered the public big genuine bal-
 loon tires on 27" wheels.
Lines Harmonic With Trees
 Studebaker probably is the first
 American manufacturer to design a
 car, not only mechanically but from
 the standpoint of appearance for gen-
 uine balloon tires. Big wide fenders
 which deeply crown over the tires are
 the first designed by any manufac-
 turer for balloon tires, so Studebaker
 cars. Body lines are low and mas-
 sive and doubtless balloon tire
 equipment was held in mind by the
 designers in shaping the new Stude-
 bakera. Wood wheels in especially
 light natural finish, together with full
 nickel plated radiators, in bright
 and sparkling contrast with jet black
 fenders and the dark blue of the bod-
 ies and they blend especially well
 with the light gray and jet black bod-
 ies of the Standard Six models.

Hedges on Four-Wheel Brakes
 Although the new Studebaker are
 regularly equipped with bigger and
 better two-wheel brakes than ever
 and with an entirely new emergency
 brake which operates on the propeller
 shaft, there is optional equipment of-
 fered in four-wheel brakes.
 The new Studebaker four-wheel
 brakes are not only of the hydraulic
 type but hydraulic power is developed
 by engine power and not by the driv-
 ing foot. Great braking force can
 be applied instantly and almost with-
 out effort by operating a valve which
 turns on the hydraulic power. The
 brakes are unique in this respect and
 different from anything on any other
 American car. Inasmuch as the brak-
 ing power instantly stops when the
 wheels stop turning, the rear wheels
 cannot remain locked and the front
 wheels cannot lock at any time. There
 are no adjustments necessary for the
 front wheels and only two points
 which require lubrication. Undoubt-
 edly a tremendous amount of interest
 will be created by the new Stude-
 baker four-wheel brakes.
 Studebaker advises its public, how-
 ever that two-wheel brakes are
 that is required. But in the event
 that four-wheel brakes are demanded
 it is able to give, so it classifies the
 simplest, most effective, and most
 durable and safe system ever put on
 an American car.

Changes in Studebaker Engines
 Of course Studebaker has made a
 great many minor changes, improve-
 ments and refinements in all the
 mechanical parts of its cars.
 Notably the engine now is in unit
 with the clutch and transmission, but
 even more important than that a new
 force feed oiling system has been de-
 signed introducing an entirely new

feature. The returning oil is strained
 before it goes back to the crank-case,
 the pump has the entire crank-
 case supply of oil strained and clean-
 ed. There is no possibility of clogged
 screens or a lack of supply of oil for
 the highest speeds.
 The entire amount of oil is pump-
 ed through the motor three times for
 every mile of travel under a varying
 pressure of fifteen to twenty-five
 pounds, according to the speed.
 Studebaker still retains the medium
 compression low speed design. The
 same as that employed by practically
 all of the leading makers of this coun-
 try. There has been an increase in
 the weight of crank-shafts on all
 models. There are bigger bearings
 and longer connecting rods in the
 models. Studebaker is one of the
 very few manufacturers of medium
 priced cars that uses the expensive
 system of machining its crank-shafts
 on its surfaces. By this process it
 secures perfect balance and thus re-
 duces vibration to the lowest possible
 minimum.
 It is expected that the Studebaker
 display rooms throughout the country
 will be the mecca for thousands of
 people who are interested in new and
 unusual designs in motor cars for the
 next several weeks.


