A LESSON FROM THE OIL SCANDAL

Not so many months ago the newspapers and other periodicals of the United States were filled with the scandal of bribery charges growing out of the leases of the Navy's oil lands in Wyoming and California. Paracularly prominent were the names to former Secretary of the Interior Vall, Edward L. Dohen's and his son, and Harry F. Sinclah. And not comes forth the belief that all these men, indicted by a Grand Jury investigation may go free on a more legal technically. go free on a mere legal technicality.

The indictments were quashed on the ground that the presence of Oliver P. Pagan, a special assistant to the Attorney-General of the United States, in the Grand Jury room at the time testimony, was taken, was illegal and had the effect of voiding the indictments. In other words, the clever lawyers hired by the three men charged with bribery were able to make Justice McCoy, who quashed bribery were able to make Justice McCoy, who quashed the indictents, believe that had Mr. Pagan not been present, the Grand Jury would not have indicted the trio. Thus do we witness how three men, rich, powerful, able to hire clever lawyers, may escape the penalties commensurate with the staggering amount of law-breaking evidence produced against them by the Government: A poor man would have been thoroughlying in just love since

man would have been longuishing in jail long since.

In our own humble estimation, however, the big thing in ot that the Government has not been able to send Fally Dolleny and son, and Sinclair to jail; for the world has known for ages that real justice is not the product of our court system. The BIC thing is that this trio, who we are told, violated the tenets of simple decency and pure hon-esty in dealing with their fellow human beings—the really BIG thing is that they may have proved untrue to the BEST that is in them.

For the sake of acquiring MONEY, (the easiest thing on earth to get), Fall, Doheny and son, and Sinclain may have deviated from the "street called straight" and "have sold their souls for a mess of pottage." In the meantime there exists—as there has always existed—the inviolate law of TRUTH, of HONESTY, that has ever dealt out to man according to man's conformity with its stringent requirements. quirements.
