50 New Books Added To the Offerings Of The Baldwin Library

To the twenty books added to the Baldwin Public Library last week an additional fifty books have arrived this week which make last week's shipment look quite small. By far the most beautiful book that the library possesses in the juvenile line is to be found in the new collection. Howard Pyle's book of "The American Story" is a work that few private libraries in the village can boast of possessing. The volume is Howard Pyle's in the strictest sense, for, in addition to the enlightening narrative of our country from the first exploration, he has given us illustrations which alone tell the story. Besides his own original artwork work, he has gathered woodcuts from the old masters and reproductions of all painted and engraved decorations, into this latest work. There is also a "Book of Discoveries" which is a story beginning with Adam and ending with Peary along with quaint old maps and colorful woodcuts.

There are books which tell how to make boats and shacks and how to care for pets and books of games and books of far away countries. There are ten tiny, little books for first graders and also a beautiful edition of "The Pied Piper of Hamelin" which comes from some foreign port. The new addition includes the following volumes for juveniles: The Story of Ab by Waterloo, A Book of Discoveries by Synge, Howard Pyle's Book of the American Story, Aeger-Son's Fairy Tales, Penrod and Sam by Knickerbocker and Sea Tales for Scouts by Kipling, Lad-a-Dog by Terhune, Shelters, Shacks and Shanties by Synge, The Book of Model Boats by Yates, Pets for Pleasure and Profit by Verrill, A Tenderfoot with Peary by York, The Greek Boy by Kingsley, 14 volumes by Thornton Burgess, Dora by the author of Heidi, Seven Years of the Red Rover by Bailey and Colonial Twins by Virginia, by Perkins.

Stories of Indians and the West include "The New Moon," "Thunder Boy," "With George Washington in the Wilderness," and "American Indian Stories." Far away lands are written of in "Katrinka," "The Little Duke," "The Dream Coach," "The Masters of the Peaks," "The Lance of Kapanan," "Jataka Tales," "The Land of the Long Night," and "Porria the Eskimo Dog." Speaking of animals, there is "Boxer and Beauty," a story of horses by the author of "A Boy of Battle."

Books on amusements include "The Games Book," "Games for Play," "The New Game of Home and School," "All the Year, Playthings," and "In the Child's World." "East of the Sun and West of the Moon," "Pondosa and the Golden Orchard," "Orchard and Your Home," "Merrylings" and "Lions and Tigers in Everysting" conclude the list.
