**In the Interest of Your Pocketbook READ THIS**

The following letter from Mr. Herbert Hoover, Secretary of Commerce of the United States, is interesting:

DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE  
Office of the Secretary  
Washington, D. C., April 14, 1921.

Mr. H. F. Cellarius,  
Sec'y The U. S. League of Building and Loan Associations, Cincinnati, Ohio.

My dear Mr. Cellarius:

On the occasion of your next annual meeting in New Orleans, may I, through you, express to the building and loan associations of the United States my sincere hope that their work may greatly extend during the coming year.

Your associations, true people's banks, popularly controlled and locally managed, have sprung up voluntarily throughout the country.

Through the system of weekly or monthly deposits by their shareholders they encourage thrift throughout the nation. Through the system of amortization, in which the building and loan associations were the pioneers, they have made their assets sound and worthy of confidence. Through loans principally upon homes, they are an instrumentality not only in solving the housing problem, but in developing self-reliance in our citizenry.

It is my earnest desire that the building and loan associations of the United States should be encouraged by the public-spirited citizens of every locality.

In the "Saturday Evening Post" of September 3, 1921, Albert W. Atwood states:

"No single institution which employs the method of monthly repayment of principal and interest has done so much to make the working man a home-owner as the Building and Loan association. \* \* \* Last year these associations added \$400,000,000 to their assets, and nearly 700,000 new subscribers."

"But valuable as the work of these institutions has been in the last few years, they cannot begin to meet the demands for funds. It is estimated that they could make \$500,000,000 more home-building loans a year if they had the money. The president of one such concern in the metropolitan area of New York City told me that he turned down \$100,000 a week in applications on good security from people of good health and with good character and good jobs."
