**Michigan Cities And Towns To Discuss Uniform Traffic Rules**

Municipal and police officials of the cities and towns of Michigan and the sheriffs of the counties of the state are displaying a deep interest in the coming uniform traffic ordinance conference that promises to see practically all sections of the state represented in Detroit on Tuesday, September 8.

More than 700 delegates, fixing Detroit as the place and September 8 as the date of the conference have been sent out by Captain W. S. Gilbreath, manager of the Detroit Automobile club, to mayors, city managers, councilmen, judges, police chiefs and sheriffs.

Draft is Ready.

The preliminary draft of a uniform traffic regulation measure has been completed by a subcommittee working with L. J. Van Schoick, director of the safety and traffic division of the auto club, and has been approved by the club's safety committee headed by Chairman Charles T. Ready.

It is expected by club officials and by the officers of Detroit's police traffic division that a number of changes may be suggested by the visiting delegates, but the hope is that when the conference comes to an end, motorists will be able to drive throughout Michigan regulated by one set of traffic rules.

Battle Creek, Port Huron and St. Joseph have already taken official action toward making certain their representatives at the conference. At St. Joseph the city council has adopted a resolution directing that the mayor, city engineer and chief of police be in Detroit on September 8. Mayor L. A. King appeared before the council and urged that this action be taken.

**Battle Creek Coming.**

Mayor Charles C. Green, of Battle Creek, who is chairman of the safety committee of that city, has notified the Detroit auto club that his full committee will attend the meeting and that Battle Creek will gladly subscribe to any ordinance that is in harmony with the other sections of Michigan.
