W. Nelson Whittemore of Whytemere Gardens, Opdyke road: "Something ought to be done about the good that the recent rains have done the country. Mrs. S. F. Trumbull, Social Director at the Community House for the summer: "The Community House has certainly paid this summer. Although many people are out of the village on vacations during the summer, still the house has been of service to those who have not been on vacations. The number of boys who came to the rooms on Saturday dropped off quite a bit; most of them being off to camp and on vacations. During the winter as many as thirty boys have been at the house at one time. The information files have been of great help to people of the village this summer. The average number of people to come to the house during the day was ten."

Clarence Viet, superintendent of local schools, who left last week for two weeks on the Nipigon River, north of Fort Arthur, Canada: "On our trip we are taking Charley, a Shain, druggist, to keep us well. Willie Bell, undertaker, to bury us if we should die, and Charles Bingham, realtor, to boost and praise our home town. I am merely the chaplain."

James W. Cobb, Birmingham postmaster: "The business of the local post office has actually doubled within the past two years. We are now serving a total of 11,000 persons over ten years of age. With the completion of Woodward avenue, and the expected arrival of new residents, the capacity of our office here will be taxed to the limit."

Robert Y. Moore, Bloomfield Township Supervisor: "If we had voted bonds for new schools in this district during the past year, the annual rate for school taxes could be lowered two or three dollars this year; this is because of an increase in assessed valuations.
