1924 REVIEW SHOWS MUCH ADVANCEMENT IN VILAGE AFFAIRS

(Continued from page 1.) It was continued and for the first time in many years Birmingham was temporarily supplied with sufficient water to meet her needs. This day, August 15, was the date of the much contemplated Franklin Center plan, which consisted of an all day program in the little village of Franklin, west of here, and which drew many local people.

August 15, was to be a rather sad occasion for the local firemen who were to witness the edition of the "Bug," the first fire truck of the village which had been so faithfully maintained and was to be the highest bidder. Two days later, on Sunday, August 17, the world's most dangerous highway, just outside the village...

The same week announcement was made by the Village Literary Club of their plan for the village center which would start officially on October 1. Four days after the meeting was the last day for filing petitions for county offices, and when the time came for the election, the village was in a state of excitement. On the 18th of the month at a special election, the village proved to be the largest in the county...
