A 'NEW MAXWELL' IS SEEN AT SHOW

A new Maxwell has come to the show this evening, improved in appearance and performance, refined and better through the efforts of the same group of engineers that designed the Chrysler Six.

The principal changes in the new models are as follows: Chassis improvements have resulted in the widely heralded statement made for the car of 25 miles to the gallon, 38 miles per hour and from 5 to 25 miles in eight seconds.

These same chassis improvements have also resulted in 15 per cent more horsepower without changing bore, stroke, or, consequently, motor displacement. This accomplishment was made possible chiefly in four ways: by improving the cooling system, cylinder block, valve seats and pistons.

From Vibration The design of the previous Maxwell was one of the soundest on the market. F. M. Zeider, vice-president in charge of Maxwell-Chrysler engineering, said, "It was simpler, efficient, economical in operation, possessed an inherent freedom from vibration and repair, and was extremely practical from a manufacturing standpoint. Obviously, the thing to do was not to change something as highly efficient as that but to carry the design still further. This we have done."

Heightening the cylinder block, redesigning the water jacketing, increasing the valve diameter, changing the valve seats, and increasing piston length, actually increased the power output 15 per cent and largely contributed to "25 miles to the gallon, 38 miles per hour and five to 25 miles in eight seconds." All valve seats and exhaust ports are now entirely rounded by water-scooting decidedly novel in low cost manufacturing. The steering has been made easier to compensate for balloon tires, which are standard on all models. The steering wheel is larger, with spark and throttle controls of the latest lever type atop the steering column.

Closer to Ground Improved appearance is due to the wider, deeper radiator, lower running boards, wider fenders with deeper, better new headlamps. New standard wheels are standard. All bodies are built closer to the ground. One-piece windshields are standard on closed models, on which shrouded visors are built integral with the top. All dash instruments are grouped in a single oval panel under glass. The touring car is finished in blue, as are all all-ott models. The upholstered in plum-colored dulanite crushed leather. The club sedan, one of the least expensive models, has been introduced a year ago, is improved in appearance. The new type visitor, once polished, new color finish and other improvements have enhanced its looks as well as its value. The upholstery is of cloth, but dual-tone crushed leather may be had at slight extra cost.

With several changes in its design, the sedan also has been improved. In addition to the new interior visor and one-piece windshields, the body bottom line has been lowered and all windows are of the same size. Extra size balloons, standard on all models, are added to the car's appearance. Its interior finish has also been improved with mohair velvet upholstery, new type hardware and better equipment throughout.
