WE HEARD IT SAID BY—
(Little Editorials picked up by the Staff in and around Birmingham.)

George H. Mitchell of Brown street: "Just to show you how property is on the gain in Birmingham, I am proud of the increase in value of certain piece fronting one of the principal corners of this little town. Some five years ago it was listed for \$30,000, at which time one of the tenants would not give up his lease for less than \$1000 per year for the unexpired term. This broke up the owner, for the piece, and now it is at \$25,000 and in due time will get \$50,000."

Albert W. Wasey, of Walsh, named Wasey Co., realtors: "I notice that the new homes in Birmingham are rather fine looking—which shows that good architecture is becoming more popular. In all the projects that our company is interested in, we demand that all buildings erected must first be submitted to us in plan, so that adjacent residence property will have something to look at besides dry goods boxes."

Harry S. Slare, village manager: "The biggest thing to be done in Birmingham this year is to build an elevated tank and extend our water mains. This project affects more people than any other in municipal affairs, and it is to be hoped that the people vote favorably when the matter is up March 9."

Joseph Beh, of Lakeview avenue: "I am in favor of our section becoming annexed to Birmingham. At the next special election I, like lots of others, was not enlightened on the question, but now I would favor that someone get the residents on the west side of Lakeview avenue together and explain to them the merits of annexation."

Charles G. Walker of South Woodward avenue: "From what I can gather from our visitors and from my own experiences, I think it is safe to say that collections of bills due at the present time are more to make than they have been for many months. Business, it would seem, is particularly good, and indications all point to a period of excellent business. This difficulty in collecting old accounts seems to point to one thing. Everyone in general seems to be making good money and likewise everyone is spending it. Most people at the present time, are living far beyond their means."

Frank L. Doty, Pontiac lawyer and attorney for the village of Birmingham: "The board of public utilities at Lansing appears to be extending its scope of authority until now it has reached a point in Birmingham where some means must be resorted to that we may ascertain just the extent of its authority. The instance of the long busses, which continue to turn off Woodward avenue on the side street, by permission of the public utilities commission after ordered not to turn by village police, would make a splendid test case. The situation as it stands now would make it appear that the public utilities commission has power to extend that of the village also in conducting village traffic. This would be a good time to settle the matter that it has been used as a reference on future questions of the same nature."

Mrs. Loren G. Stauch of Ridgedale avenue: "This is one of the village husbands will welcome Lent. The beginning of Lent will mean the end of the Married People's Dances.
