## Baldwin Library Offers New Books For Summer Hours

A list of books suitable for summer reading has been compiled for the patrons of the Baldwin Library and an interesting group of recently published volumes has also been added during the month of July for age groups.

The fascinating travel book, "Cross" by Merian Cooper, stands out conspicuously among the new books. The six new works of fiction that will make very popular summer reading are "Face Cards" by Carolyn Wells, "Meredith Mystery" by Natalie S. Lincoln, and "Beauty Prize" by Weston George Joseph S. Fletcher has gained a popular place on the reading list, two new books written by him, appearing on the shelves, his "Ravensdene Court" and "Mill of the Many Windows" will offer to his readers a degree that his unequalled "Where the Blue Begins" has been added.

In addition to these comparatively recently published works Mrs. Furdy, librarian, has compiled an interesting list of books that contain all the characteristics that summer readers so often demand. Fiction that is mysterious or romantic is in ample supply, by Susan Ertz, "Crying of Ann" by Emma S. Sampson, "The Ladies by Emily Barrington, "My Lady of the Chinese Courtyard" by Elizabeth Cooper, "Love" by Mary Russell, and "A Voice From the Dark" by Edith Phillips are suggested.

Recently published works of fiction will continue through the summer months to be of interest to readers. The library offers unusual opportunity in this respect. "So Big" by Edna Ferber, "Daughter of Man" by the charming Cora Harris, "High Five" with Detroit for a slogan, "Drums" a stirring novel of the Revolution, "Barren Ground," Ellen Glasgow's latest novel of New England's farmers, and "Arrow-smith" depicted by Sinclair Lewis among the new works of fiction.

Herbert Quigley of "Covered Wagon" fame appears in this group with his shelves. Victorians as well as modernity is satirized in a charming way by Rose Macaulay in "The Unfortunates" and Edith Wharton in the unusual plot of her "Mother's Recompense" meets the needs of summer readers.

"In addition to fiction a group of biographies, travelogues, and essays filled with just such human interest as the novels has been prepared. Albert Bigelow Paine's "Life of Mark Twain" and Ida Tarbell's "In the Footsteps of the Lincoln" certainly contain these characteristics. To those who long to go to distant countries for vacation, such volumes as Frederick O'Connell's "White Shadow in the South Sea" and E. A. Powell's "Beyond the Utmost Purple Rim" will be enjoyed. The latter is a personal account of travels in Madagascar, Abyssinia and Zanzibar.

Then there is a new Carpenter volume of Alaska that has also been purchased.

Christopher Morley's "Modern Fables" and Henry Van Dyke's "Little Rivers" and "The Blue Flower" are enjoyable books to pick up for a few moments. Last but not least is the uncomparable Stephen Leacock "Discovery England."
