Quarton And Lynch Will Seek Re-Election On The Board

Walden has five candidates for the two vacancies on the board of education. Three from Birmingham and two from Eco City, the school district in the city's north end, will appear in an annual school election every held here. The election begins at two o'clock on Wednesday, July 4, and continues through the annual school board meeting in the morning until nine o'clock. Both the election and the board meeting will be held in the Baldwin high school.

Fred V. Quorton and Leigh Lynch are the two candidates for the two vacant board of education and both will be candidates for re-election.

Quorton is the present chairman of the board, and it is said by other members of the board that his re-election is a foregone conclusion. Lynch will be a loss to the board. Especially at this time as Mr. Quorton has been working so hard accomplishing such outside work as the school board.

On the recently acquired school property and numerous things that have been purchased for the school, the total cost is \$340,250. This has provided for the new addition to the Adams school building, the new playground and the playground for the Adams school.

Mr. Quorton is himself a graduate of the Birmingham High School, the only one of his family to do so. He has lived here since he was eight years old and has been active in the community. He has served as village commissioner, was village assessor for two years and in the last term of three years has been a resident of the Adams school District. "If selected as trustee again," says Mr. Quorton, "I should give the work the same careful consideration that I have."

Leigh Lynch, the other of the two candidates for re-election, has only

Suggestions Now Being Received For Location Of Proposed Building

\$60,000 TO BE ASKED FOR

Suggestions are being received this week by Robert Moore, township supervisor for the location of the proposed soldiers' and sailors' memorial building, which will be an issue of the township election on July 14. Locations within and outside of the village are among the suggestions and according to Mr. Moore, it is yet a question as to whether the site will be in the village or out Woodward avenue, nearer the

\$60,000 is the amount to be asked by the township board for the erection of the building and the method to be adopted in raising the money will be a three mill tax. Such a building as has been roughly sketched would contain, besides an auditorium and rooms and offices for the American Legion, the offices of the

The entire building would be under the direction of the township board. The board will select the site as well.

While the building will serve as a memorial to veterans of all wars and will be designed ultimately to suit their needs particularly it will be a public institution and will be open to the public. One of the advantages of building outside of Birmingham would be to provide a park surrounding the building, of sufficient size to serve the entire township.

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Permission Given D.U.R. To Charge 3 Cents Per Mile

Permission has been granted Detroit United Railway receivers to collect three cents a mile for travel on the D.U.R. interurban cars by the public Utilities Commission in Lansing, to take effect starting last Wednesday morning. It was said at

This new rate will affect all interurban lines of the D. U. R., including the Detroit-Pontiac division, with the exception of the Detroit-Wyandotte division which is now operating under franchise. It is stated that there was no objection raised at the hearing by any of the affected sections. D. U. R. officials and the railroad state that this rate will not enable them to serve the area.
