

\$30.00 And A Desire Formed The Foundation Of A Growing Business

"When I get to be a big man and have lots of money I'm going to have a great big business all my own," says every young hopeful about his fifth year. And the answer from Alexander B. Craig comes, "My boy, you need neither to be a 'big man' nor do you need 'lots of money.' It is the desire, that counts. Set your goal and start reaching for it."

Five years ago Mr. Craig set his goal as the production of 10,000 loaves of bread each day with a corresponding quantity of pastry and other baked goods. His dream of being a "big man" with "lots of money" materialized, (as dreams have a habit of doing) into a man of small stature with an invest of \$30.00 in a business all his own.

The \$30 was invested in a small commercial oven, and the rental of a business place in the central part of Birmingham completed the setting up in business. By diligently working, Mr. Craig was able to turn out 25 loaves of bread a day and such other baked goods as are handled in a small shop. Today Mr. Craig is seriously considering if his dream of 10,000 loaves a day had not better be changed to 20,000 or upwards. Today his ovens are turning out more than

has encouraged the men to dispose of the goods on their lead and is one of the branches that has kept the business constantly increasing.

Since the business has been on a large production plan the equipment has increased accordingly, until it is now contained in two buildings. The bread is made in the rear of the Craig bakery and all other pastries and baked goods are made in the ovens of the former Kapaloff Bakers on East Maple avenue, which very nearly adjoins the Craig bakery at the rear.

In the two places there are twenty men employed, besides the energetic owner, shifts working night and day to provide the community with the "starchy" part of its diet.

"It certainly wasn't my capital that placed me where I am today and it wasn't my size but a concentrated effort toward my goal of 10,000 loaves a day," said Mr. Craig of his boy to wait until he was 'big' and had 'lots of money.' "Those things don't just happen."

OAKLAND CO. ASKED TO PAY \$300,000 FOR WIDENING WOODWARD

This agreement be accepted, relieving Oakland County from any further financial obligation in the widening of Woodward avenue. Since the road widening operations were begun, there has been an uncertainty as to the amount that would be required from Oakland County. It was determined that the conference was called Tuesday. Although never verified, it has been understood for some time that the state was making a demand for a large sum of money to carry this project, which the county had made no arrangements to finance.

In an interview with several members of the committee in attendance at the conference Tuesday, gratification was manifested over the application of the unpaid state reward money to the assessment of this large sum required. The state automobile license money annually amounts to approximately \$18,000 which amount is supposed to go to the road maintenance fund. The part due the county has been accumulated for several years, which amount will be accepted by the state as the first payment on the \$800,000 assessment.

However, the reduction of \$100,000.00 from the maintenance fund

annually, is to be applied on the debt, will necessitate the county raising more money in its annual budget for maintenance work during the period the Woodward widening is being paid for.

At the conference Governor Greenback manifested interest in plans for widening south Saginaw street in Pontiac and to make a trip to Pontiac yesterday to confer with the city manager. His visit was a tentative plan to be submitted by C. W. Ham, the manager. While the question of what was to be the disposition of Woodward avenue through Birmingham, was mentioned at the conference, nothing definite was reached as to the settlement of it or the time of its settlement.

Members of the County Road Committee who served as delegates to the meeting were Alfred Gale, chairman; Joe Brooks, M. E. Armstrong, Howard Hillman, Philip Covestry, Andrew Sealey and Frank Ely. Robert Moore, of Birmingham, also a member of the committee, was out of town. Other delegates were county road commissioners, Thomas Lytle, Luther B. Allen, and G. Ross Thompson; county engineer L. V. Balknap; representatives P. J. Miller and James E. Lawson; Judge Glenn C. Gillespie, C. W. Hamm; James H. Lynch, attorney for the county road commission; and Willis M. Brewer, chairman of the county board auditor.
