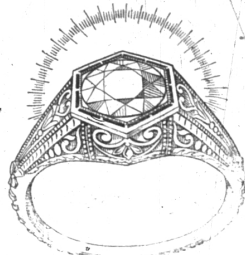

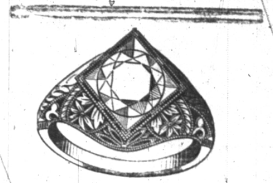

**Menhaden Fish Defended**  
Menhaden fish, the oil from which has many commercial uses, is also an excellent food fish though as yet unpopular because of its great number of bones. Food experts, however, are overcoming this by grinding the fish bones and air so as to make a fish meal or powder, in which form it can be converted into cakes and eaten easily.
