To The Editor: After reading the article written by Mr. Moore in the extra edition of this paper, we wish to make the following correction. It is true that Mr. Robt. V. Moore was appointed to the office of supervisor by the township board composed of three men to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Luther D. Allen. This should not lead to the presumption that he is the people's choice, or that the right obtained in the office of township clerk or as a time when few assessments are made, could not be acquired by another person of good intelligence.

Mr. Moore states in his article that he made many assessments during the absence of Mr. Allen, and that none of these were changed by Mr. Allen by the Board of Review, but in reviewing Mr. Allen we find that the assessments made by Mr. Moore were in Ego City with the exception of one on W. W. Maple road. Mr. Allen says that he changed many figures himself before the Board of Review met, but said nothing about it.

Because of the resignation of the former supervisor, we have come to the consideration of twenty representative citizens with knowledge of many complicated and perplexing problems to be solved by the township supervisor. We have come to the conclusion that Mr. Fred V. Quorton possesses the necessary qualifications. He is a man of high character; he is conservative; he has a thorough knowledge of Bloomfield township and its needs; he is progressive; he

is alert to the rapid rise in land values he has been assessing; he has done considerable building in and near Birmingham; he knows the value of buildings old and new which is an absolute necessity for fair taxation; he is a man who will not allow friendship or personal interest to interfere with property values.

In sponsoring the candidacy of Mr. Quorton, we wish it understood that it is without personal feeling against Mr. Moore but that we are exercising our rights as citizens and have, at heart, only the best interests of our township to secure the best man available.

These remarks are intended only to clear the field of any unfair statements that may be made and not to influence the good judgment of its voters but with the hope in mind that every voter will go to the polls Saturday, March 7th, from 2 to 8 p.m. and exercise their choice.

To Hear Objections To Long Lake Paving

Saturday afternoon, March 14, at two o'clock, in the date and time when members of the Oakland County Road Commission will convene to hear objections and suggestions to the proposed installation of a concrete pavement on the Long Lake road, at Bloomfield Center, east to the East Lake road, a distance of six and one-fourth miles. The Commission will meet at the residence of Ralph Moore in Troy township.

When this road is completed it will offer the motorist an almost straight east and west movement between Orchard Lake and the Rochester road. The completion of the pavement over East Maple avenue from Birmingham to John R. road, together with the Auburn road, will relieve to a great extent the traffic harass of the public in Bloomfield and Troy townships. It is felt by the Road Commission.

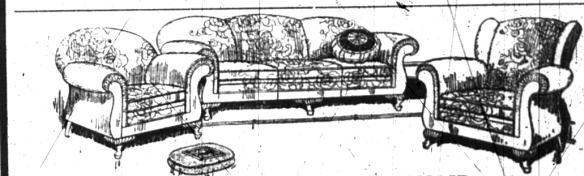
It is estimated that there are only 15 qualified electors in Birmingham who have not yet registered on the village roll, and of course, will not be able to vote next Monday.
