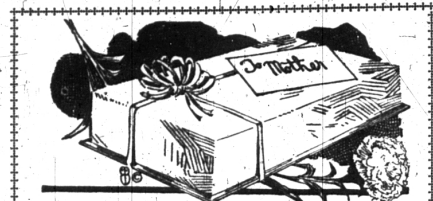

even though there are no passengers, and in this way hope to build up a client Harry Brown, of the Brooks Aviation Field one-half mile east of Farmington Junction. The field was established by and named for Brooks.

Sufficient planes will be maintained at the fields to carry a large number of passengers. Two passengers are to be carried in a plane. There are 41 aviators in the association besides a large number of mechanics and owners. The association was formed for the purpose of developing city fields over the state and promoting air meets. An inspection and classification service is to be one of the important branches of the association and all aviators participating in the passenger service will be required to pass a series of examinations for license. In this way the association expects to eliminate the dangers of air travel.

Another branch of the association will conduct an inspection of air craft. An attempt is also to be made by the association to have planes carrying passengers inspected, and unsafe planes or machines that are too old to operate, condemned. The new service will operate either Curtiss or Standard ships that will be thoroughly inspected before and after each trip.
