Let's assume that differences of opinion will always arise between two or more persons; to settle them two means may be used, one of them quite wisely, the other quite brutishly. If I differ with you about anything under the sun, why can't we get together in peaceful conversation and settle-the affair feasonably? Is it really necessary for us to takeloff our coats, roll up our sleeves and, in a vain effort to settle the trouble, proceed to punch each other? A peaceful conversation will tend to bring our MINDS in agreement upon any problem; we would have to compromise, of course, but when we finished our MENtallities would be quieted, our THOUGHTS would be talities would be quieted, our THOUGHTS would be peacefully inclined.

If we resort to physical combat it is true that the one who is beaten must, because his strength is exhausted, give up; thus, in a physical engagement, the strongest body is the victor. Yet, even though ithe one who suffers physical defeat-is unable to further defend himself, his MIND is just as it was when the combat started, plus the stimulus which the beating has added. He will fight again when the bedy recovers

when his body recovers.

The same is true of nations. Unable to agree over some matter, either trivial or affecting the material growth of itself, the collective group of people known as a nation may become hostile toward another country. Unless the matter is settled by arbitration and compromise, physical warfare will ensue. Human lives will be taken, and both

warfare will ensue. Human lives will be taken, and both countries will then face an indefinite period of Meavy internal taxation. It always works out after this fashion—individual HUMAN BEINGS pay the price in taxation. The only group of people who benefit, (and this is materially only); are the manufacturers of those things needed to make war with. They, of course, will always be against anything that will outlaw war.

WHEN MEN'S SOULS BECOME SCARLET

A number of hitherto highly respected citizens of Detroit have been publicly pointed out by Judge Frank Murphy as mixed up with illegal transactions in regard to public improvements; the courageous young jurist, after many weeks during which time he acted as a one-man grand jury to hear evidence of graft, malfessance of of-tice, and kindred law violations, gave out his findings last Saturday, asking that criminal proceedings be started against 19 men.

Surely the fact that millions of dollars of Detroit's Surely the fact that millions of 'dollars' of Detroit's money was wrongly obtained by scheming contractors. public officials, and petty grafters should not point eny finger of scorn upon the city of Detroit; such affairs are rather commonplace in this modern, "civilized" and enlightened Twentieth Century. The larger the governing body, the larger the graft that may mulc the public treasury. Detroit may have lost millions in this way, while the Federal government is said to lose hundreds of millions from time to time. from time to time.

The facts given out by Judge Murphy emphasize statements made in this column on many occasions, namely: that money is the easiest thing on earth to get. A man or a woman may accumulate a large fortune and do it honestly: such fortunes are later spent wisely for the good of the average boy and girl, man and woman, in enter-prises that are never sponsored by organized society.

Any of the 17 men mentioned by Judge Murphy who

may be found; after due legal process, guilty of wrongfully obtaining money, will perhaps be sentenced to remain away from their fellow-beings for a period of time. They

may reform, and become good citizens; this is hoped for.

But the fact still remains that the guilty ones, whenthey were away from the scrutiny of watchful citizens, succumbed to dishonesty; they betrayed the trust that
placed in them by the rich and the poor alike; they are
as bleeding in soul as the Magdalenes on any darkened

They are, of course, the kind of men who should not be trusted or followed.

TEETERING ON THE BRINK

Europe has never been so near anarchy as it is right now. The rich men of France have avoided their income taxes since the war as they avoided these taxes before the war. The poor know it. France has borrowed nearly as much money since the war to pay for military domination of Europe as she borrowed during the war. France refuses to restrict her land armaments and impedes the restriction of sea disagramenent in the matter of submarines. In addition to all this trouble which is chiefly economic—a horrible tax gouging policy that is sending France to bank-ruptcy—she has developed a political deadlock by letting the religious issue get into politics.

The Catholics and the anti-clerical are at sach other's throats. No same settlement of the economic problems of France can be achieved because of political jealousies that rise out of religious differences. So much for France.
