 Twenty-seven per cent of the cattle in Michigan were given the T. B. test last year and only 2.2 per cent were found as reactors.
 It is estimated that about 600 Michigan residents, cranking cars, have suffered fractured arms during the last 12 months (while less than 100 have been injured through being kicked by mules, horses and cows).
 Efforts are under way to cap the monster flowing well in Grosse Ile, near Detroit. It is thought to be responsible for the drying up of many wells near there.
 Last year 16 per cent of the state's school population graduated from highschools and eight per cent from colleges, says T. J. Johnson, state superintendent of public instruction.
 There are 48 counties in the state that have had special sparring laws on fish during the past.

Location, Birmingham, Royal Oak and Pontiac will compete together as Class A in the afternoon when there will also be classes between the Class B contestants which includes all the high schools in the county with smaller subdivisions.
