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Big Advance Sale In B'ham Forest Hills

"Although the plat of Birmingham Forest Hills has just been recorded, the contracts which will be installed within a very short time. In addition to the improvements, the property will be well restricted, with restrictions carefully enforced for the benefit of the owners.

PIERCE STREET PAVING IS DELAYED FOR YEAR

At an interview by Fred V. Quarles with the city drainage engineers, it was disclosed that within sixty days the work of installing the drain on Pierce street would be started. This work will take about ninety days and will be completed. This will necessarily postpone the improving of the Pierce street road for another year.

The board was appointed by the Board of Education to confer with the Leinbach-Humphrey company in this matter, following their request that the board appoint a committee to work with them in furthering the improvement of Pierce street. A full committee known as the Pierce Street Improvement association was formed for this purpose. It was hoped that the drain could be laid earlier in the spring and Pierce street, possibly paved this summer.

It was the idea of the Leinbach-Humphrey Co., that, inasmuch as the Pierce street school was located along Pierce street from Lincoln avenue and west at the Thirteenth and across Southfield road.

STAUCH ACQUIRES 100 FEET ON S. WOODWARD

Within a few weeks the home of Dr. and Mrs. N. T. Shaw at Woodward avenue and Brown street is to be transferred into a business building by the new owner, Loren G. Stauch of Ridgeland avenue, who this week purchased the property. Dr. Shaw and his family have occupied the home for the past twenty-three years. Since they came to Birmingham from Franklin, after a short residence there.

Mr. Stauch intends to make some temporary alterations in the house to make it more convenient for a business location and besides moving his own office there he will likely rent a part of the house to other business men. As soon as it is determined what is to be done in the matter of widening Woodward avenue, Mr. Stauch is expecting to erect a business block on the site. The property has about 100 feet frontage on both Woodward avenue and Brown street.

NEW TELEPHONE CABLE LINKS MICHIGAN CITIES

Installation of a toll cable between Detroit and Flint has recently been completed, the total cost of the project being approximately \$1,000,000. This cable will carry as many as 300 simultaneous conversations. The project has been under way for some time, but due to the general curtailment of construction work during the war, an unusual delay of two years elapsed after the completion of the first section.

The cutting into service of this cable marks the completion of the second step in the gradual conversion of the toll open wire lines and wires out of Detroit. Not only will the new cable provide greater facilities, but it will also assure a better service on account of greater safety from storm damage, tree interference and inductive disturbances.

BAPTISTS PURCHASE SITE FOR CHILDREN'S HOME HERE

The people of this vicinity will welcome the coming of the Baptist Children's Home. The Baptists of Detroit have purchased a 25,000 acre site at Toward Road and Thirteenth Mile Rd., which they have already made the refuge of 12 homeless children and the influence of the Baptist organization has already been felt in the community. This good work of caring for the orphan and homeless children is in the hands of Mrs. A. Lankin, Matron, who is ably assisted by Mrs. Lankin, who has been connected with church work in Detroit for many years.

Twelve children reside at the home at this time with three others placed in different homes under the supervision of the child. Mrs. Lankin has the assistance of Miss Van Arde, of Detroit, a trained Sunday School teacher, who is conducting a day school in the work of the Junior Sunday School Department. Miss Mitchell and Mrs. Carney, both of Detroit, are in charge of the day school. The children are being placed in charge of the Beginners and Primary Departments. They are following out a system of graded work that has been showing surprising results. The popularity of the Sunday School is attested by the increase in attendance, starting with 100 and jumping to 150 within four weeks.

Ladies' Aid Society

Members of the Ladies' Aid Society will hold their regular annual meeting at the home of Mrs. Allen on Wednesday, May 10, at which time an election of officers will be held. The Ladies' Aid has been doing wonderful work in the community and is hoped that the officers elected at the annual meeting will carry on in the same faithful manner as has been done in the past. The field for future work is large and plans are in the making for better and greater work in the coming year, which can only be accomplished with full cooperation of the majority of the residents of this district.

New Community Church

Mrs. Payne, of Meadowlark Gardens, in charge of the plans for the building of the new Community church on Thirteenth Mile Road which is progressing rapidly. The finance committee of the church reports pledges for enough money to complete the building fund and work on the plans has already begun. The proposed building will be simple in design, but the interior will be as grand additions in the future as needed. Mrs. Payne is a graduate engineer and her careful and judicious handling of the best advantage. It is expected that the church will be completed and ready for occupancy by the first of June.

Improvement Association
