NOTICE—A special meeting of the legal voters of School District No. 1 Fractional of the Townships of Bloomfield, Troy, Royal Oak and Southfield, Oakland County, Michigan, called by the District Board, of said District, will be held in the Baldwin High School building in Birmingham, Michigan, in said District on the 12th day of May, A. D. 1925, at 10 o'clock A. M., Central Standard Time for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of said District the proposition to authorize the District Board:

1. To borrow the sum of Two Hundred Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$270,000) and to issue the bonds of the District therefor bearing interest at the rate of 4 3/4 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, both principal and interest to be payable at Birmingham, Michigan, said bonds to be dated June 1, A. 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Detroit Motorbus Co. To Start Passenger Service To Detroit

Permission was granted the Detroit Motorbus Company early last week to establish and operate a motorbus passenger line from the Oakland Hills Country Club through Birmingham on Southfield Road to the Windsor Ferry dock in Detroit. The license came through the Michigan Public Utilities Commission. Permission was given to start on this route May 1. But according to W. F. Evans of Quanton Road, president of the Detroit Motor Bus Company, the service likely will not be started until about May 8, when the fleet of six six-wheel single deck busses to be used in the service arrive. According to the announcement, there will be hourly service between 7:15 and 8:15 in the morning and 5:15 and 6:15 in the evening the service will be on a 15-minute basis.

Starting at the Oakland Hills Golf Club, the route of the main line will follow West Maple road into Birmingham; out of Birmingham on the Southfield road to Northwestern highway, to the Northwestern highway to the Seven-Mile Road; Along Seven Mile to Livernois avenue; on Livernois road to Second boulevard to the Burroughs Adding Machine Company, thence over Cass avenue; on Cass to Adams avenue; on Adams to Woodward avenue and down Woodward to the Windsor ferry dock.

Along this line of travel there will be bus stops designated immediately. Service will also be given on Southfield road from Northwestern highway to Seven-Mile road and from that point on Seven-Mile road to where Northwestern highway cuts into Birmingham. The Northwestern highway is paved the line will use the latter route only, and after it is paved will use both routes.
