Lutheran Church To Observe A Birthday

Sunday is the first anniversary of Redeemer Evangelical Lutheran Church, of Birmingham. Two special services will be held. At 10:30 A. M. Rev. E. Buchheimer will have charge, and at 8:00 o'clock P. M. Rev. E. Buchheimer of Detroit will talk to the congregation.

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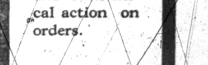
