BONSTELLE PLAYHOUSE  
OFFERS "THE WASHOUT"

A new American comedy drama,  
"The Washout," will be the offering  
of the Bonstelle Company at the Play-  
house next week, beginning Mon-  
day night, Nov. 23rd. This play  
which is typical of the works that  
have brought fame and fortune to  
Frank Craven, is the work of Frank  
Dazey, Jr., the son of the famous  
author of "In Old Kentucky."  
This play was purchased by the  
well known and successful producer,  
Mr. Geo. Tyler who had planned up-  
on Glen Hunter for the leading role.  
However, the success of this prom-  
ising young man in "Mr. Woodley"  
precluded an early production, so in-  
stead around Mr. Tyler hit upon  
Miss Bonstelle to make the produc-  
tion, sending on the well known stage  
director, Mr. Hugh Ford, to assist  
in the direction of the play.  
"The Washout" is a play typically  
American. It concerns a young chap  
reared in the lap of luxury but who  
after his father's death, is left large-  
ly with a position. He falls in love  
with and marries a young girl, whose  
mother had social and financial aspira-  
tions. The play opens at the time  
"Jamsey" and Steffy return from  
their honeymoon, to find themselves  
installed in a small apartment at a  
cost of \$3,500 per year. "Jamsey"  
is plainly worried and is looking for  
a letter from his firm, which he hopes  
contains a check for a month's salary  
and a promised raise. But things  
have not been going well with his  
firm and when he finally receives the  
letter it contains a check that barely  
meets his bills and his discharge.

"THE GORILLA" TO RUN SEC-  
OND WEEK AT GARRICK

Last Sunday night something hap-  
pened in Detroit that made the wise-  
owl of years look up and take notice.  
It concerned an entertainment with  
the name of Gorilla, which had  
been taken up in New York, and  
was donated to Chicago and Bos-  
ton before it was tagged for De-  
troit. The big city writers and cov-  
ers gilded words to let us know  
outside of their district that this play  
was a cornucopia of thrills and  
laughs. How in the name of a saint  
winer a gorilla could be a good  
yellow enough to tickle the ribs of  
human nature with the spirit of fun  
was like looking for a green rose.  
And oddly to say that it is about  
what happened, and again calls at-  
tention to the the of luck in favor-  
ing the Garrick Theatre, which  
somehow has walked into the hearts  
and talk of Detroiters.  
To get down to brass tacks, "The  
Gorilla" is a home made play with

mystery as its breathing cause and  
fun as its routing consequence, and  
as in weaving life we live, little goes  
to suit us, but everything jumps side-  
wise to hinder. The author of the  
mystery is Ralph Spence, a newspa-  
per graduate of Texas, who knows  
that laughter was more sound and  
better feeling when the cause is on  
the other fellow. Minions of the law,  
Mr. Mulligan and Mr. Garrity, lift  
American humor, which rests on ex-  
aggeration, to the highest notch of  
laughing effect. What is all about  
this surprising and amusing play of  
the saturating charm of the whole  
proceeding. It would not be fair nor  
nattering to go into a detailed  
of the mystery elements of the piece,  
and to arrive at an understanding of  
why "The Gorilla" is such a towering  
favorite with the mixed world in  
which we live.

Another good thing about this new  
success of an American comedy under  
the guise of a mystery play is that it  
shoots home the truth by the keen  
satire of its story, and sends every-  
body home with a good taste on their  
mouths. All hail to "The Gorilla"  
and its cargo of frolic at the expense  
of —well never mind—see it.
