**First Pack of Fox Hunting Hounds**  
Established in England in 1750

Sportsmen of Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills have keenly anticipated the opening of the hunting season and as the date set for this event occurred last Saturday, many adherents of the picturesque sport will probably be seen galloping after the hounds this week-end. For the last two months the young hounds at the Bloomfield Open Hunt Club have undergone training by hunting the young foxes.

Hunting is one of the oldest of pastimes and the pursuit of game, whether for sport or food, has from earliest times been one of the characteristic features of human life. The establishment of regular packs of fox hunting hounds began in England with the Puritans in 1750, when beginning stamped the breed on the lines from which the English hound has been developed. In fact, many of the packs established in the latter part of the eighteenth century, as far as other blood is concerned, boast an unbroken existence, such as the Belvoir, 1756; the Quorn, and the Cotswoldes.

The Coniston Foxhounds, established in 1825 by Anthony Gaskarth of Coniston Hall, Lancashire, though not of the blood are still in existence and have an interesting history. The area covered by these hounds is remarkable for the number of packs and various sorts which have hunted in it during the last century and a half. Mr. Leonard's hounds at Emsdale, Cumberland, may be called the ancestors of the Coniston for two of the best, the Eskdale and Emsdale from Broadgate was introduced into the Coniston at a later date.

In Lancashire James Macbell kept foxhounds at Newby Bridge, which passed on his death in 1848 to George Woodburne, and were kennelled at Hazelrigg. A very long run from Blakeholme on Windermere to Highstreet, Fairfield, and Helvellyn has received deserved notice for many years. These hounds joined with the Coniston near Rusland, and killed on Yewbarrow.

Mr. Townley had hounds at Town Head in 1810. Mr. Benson Harrison had hounds at Water Park and the remains of his kennels were removed only two years ago.

In Westmorland packs of hounds hunted in the Fod bank, Black Well, Bowness, Troutbeck, Ambleside, and Grasmere. The Coniston country originally was noted from Long Shilcliffe and Blake Combe, but is considerably less; parts are hunted by two younger packs, the Emswater and the Eskdale and Emsdale. When started, the Coniston hounds were to hunt fox, mart, and hare, but for many years they have not hunted marts and the hares have been left to the Furness Beagles and Windermere Hunters. Coniston was said to be a shuttle sport for marts of both kinds, but not many were killed. Since the death of Capt. Bouffant de Mervielles at Emswater this branch of fox-hunting has not been followed. At one time it was usual to hunt fox and hare alternately and later, if a fox had not been found by midday the pack would hunt hare, but hare hunting was discontinued after some 50 years.

The hunt was in the hands of Mr. Gaskarth and Mr. Jackson from 1825 to 1839, and was kept up by subscription. There was no huntman; the hounds were trounced-fed. The first huntman was appointed by J. G. Marshall (1850-55) of Monk Coniston Hall.

According to Edwin Waugh the pack about the country then killed 28 foxes in 29 consecutive meets. The next master, William Bell (1855-66) hunted hounds in the county, assisted by one of the field until a huntman was appointed. In Mr. Bell's time the kennels at Coniston were built free of charge, everything for the building being given by support. There was no huntman; the conclusion of their work by a squire at the Ship Inn. Mr. Bell showed excellent for 13 seasons, after which he was succeeded by Miles Reynolds (1866-70), who had not only a huntman, but also a professional whipper-in, who were both seen in pink.

After this Edmund Lodge had the hounds a year. The next master, J. E. Bridson (1870-80) of Brierwood, brought his own huntman, a long distance runner, and a number of his harriers from near Bolton. The first meet was at Graythwaite.

W. Penny restarted the Hunt with kennels at Satterthwaite. The latter, with Mr. Bridson's kennels at Sawrey and those at Coniston, are no longer in use and have fallen into disrepair. When the Rev. E. M. Reynolds became Master in 1881 the pack was established in the present headquarters at Greenbank, Ambleside. Mr. Reynolds retired in favor of George Grundy in 1907. The following year John and Bruce Logan amalgamated their private pack with the Coniston and became joint masters. John Logan died in 1909, since when his brother has been sole Master. The Hunt again became a subscription pack in 1902, and is now controlled by a committee consisting of Mr. Logan, his nephews, and Mr. Grundy.
