

SUPERIOR HIGHWAY PROPOSAL

ROAD COMMISSION PRESENTS MAP SHOWING ALL EXISTING COUNTY ROADS

For the first time in the history of Oakland County a definite highway plan has been presented for the future growth and adequate transportation facilities for the traveling public.

The board voted its approval of a map of the county on which had been placed by the county road commissioners all of the existing roads, together with state trunk and secondary roads, already designated as such.

For more than a year efforts have been made by the county's future highway, to get the board to lay down a plan of road building which would form the basis of a future road construction and would give the entire county a uniform plan.

The resolutions adopted by the road commissioners at their meeting Aug. 18 read: "Whereas the development of much of Oakland County is being so rapid that lands in all parts of the county are being divided and platted.

That on said map showing said plan there be written or printed such memorandum as shall serve to indicate the various widths of the highways hereby included in said plan, including said highways with widths indicated as determined by the state highway commissioner, and that there be endorsed its approval in writing on said map.

Supervisor Alfred Gale of Waterford moved that the clause referring to the roads bordering lakes not being abandoned be stricken from the resolution.
