The Sedan has four broad doors and the deep upholstery is toned to harmonize with the finish of the body.

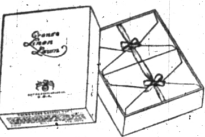
Two body styles on the same chassis and with the same wheelbase are available, the Sedan and the Touring model.

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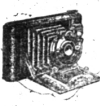

WE HEARD IT SAID BY

(Little Editorials picked up by the Staff in and around Birmingham.)

Mrs. Charles J. Shain, of Pierce street: "Fifteen years ago and beyond, the usual impulse that actuated an individual to go to college was, sincere, serious desire to obtain higher education. Two weeks ago, at the local Rotary club meeting, I said that many students today seek college or university life partly because a certain thrill is not found in the home—may be found upon the campus. Of course, there are a great many students today who go to college because they really desire higher education; students to whom the campus thrill, social or otherwise, is not the overpowering influence that attends their studies. The difficult problem that confronts education today is to separate the serious student from the one who is after 'thrills.' It is for this serious student that the Birmingham Student Loan Fund exists; it is for this student that I have worked so hard during my connection with this Fund here."

Alfred Gale, Supervisor of Waterford Township: "I am opposed to the county purchasing the proposed site on Wayne street, adjoining the old jail, for a new county building. It is entirely too small, being only about 180 by 140 feet. I would much prefer buying an entire block out from the main business street and pay more for it, if necessary. Then we would have something in reserve for the future. It would also be a wonderful thing for the entire county to have a building where the people could park their cars without having to walk as far as they do at the present location."

J. E. Valentine, of Worth street: "I don't think there would be any reason to widen Woodward avenue where it goes through Birmingham more than to take off from the curbs and walks. Then if there is not enough space let them go back of the Grand Trunk tracks and build the road through there. I believe our main street would be uncluttered for pedestrians if that tremendous traffic were to pass continually. One would almost need a car to drive across if he wanted to go from one side to the other."

S. O. Wylie Bell, village commissioner: "It's rather hard on the pheasants this year to have to avoid the hunters' guns. I won't say that I would refuse to eat a nice fat pheasant, but I'm afraid that I have not the heart to go out and shoot one."

Charles E. McCurdy, St. James' Episcopal Rector here: "I am glad to congratulate the local Methodist church on obtaining the services of Rev. E. M. Atkins as its new pastor. I also want to congratulate Rev. Atkins on coming to Birmingham, for he has a fine spirit and field in which to work. It is a fine thing to me to witness that many of our preachers today, who are really desirous of doing God's work, will not allow the confines of any certain denomination to stop their activities. For any man, regardless of his denomination, who does a good and kind act, does a good and kind act for the entire uplifting of the social structure."

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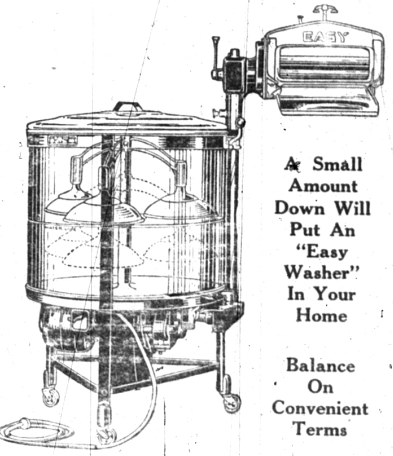
