VILLAGE TO PURCHASE NEW STREET GRADER

Increased traffic over Birmingham streets coupled with the fact that this Spring has been unusually wet, is responsible for the proposed purchase of a power driven street grader. Manager Start was authorized Monday night to buy the new grader at once. Another piece of equipment which the village may purchase this Spring is an automatic street sweeper. At present street sweeping is done by hand. The new sweeper would be used after midnight each night, thereby interfering with parking conditions during the day.

7500 Dealers Now Handle Chevrolet

During the last seven months the Chevrolet Motor Company added 1,619 direct and associate dealers to its selling force, making a total of almost 7,500 dealers in all parts of the country, an increase of more than 27 per cent.

The continued and steady growth of industrial development in the south and the expansion of its good roads system is reflected by the greater increase in dealer representation in southern territories. Almost the total selling force of the average motor car company is represented alone in the number of new dealers added to the Chevrolet organization. Demand for Chevrolet franchises demonstrates the decided favor accorded the new improved Chevrolet by the buying public throughout the country.

Smaller communities, with the augmented sales force afforded by the additional associate dealers, will be assured of adequate service close at hand, while the direct dealers, generally located at county seats, will be assured of a more thorough coverage of their outlying territory.

Typical of the increased buying power of the south are reports of new dealers from four of the larger representative branch offices. Atlanta, Ga. zone headquarters, reported 107 new dealers handling Chevrolet cars. Memphis, Tenn., 100 new dealers; Charlotte, N. C., 68 and New Orleans, 52 new dealers. Minneapolis and Des Moines showed the largest number of new dealers acquired in the northern areas.

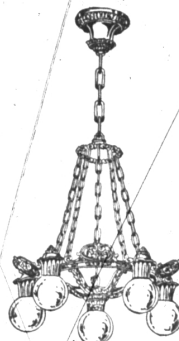

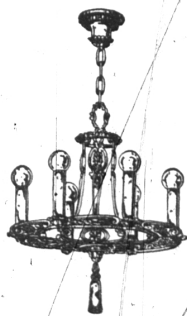

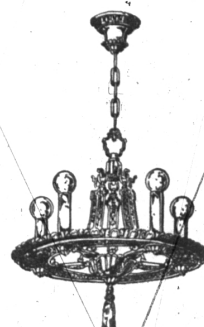
