"WHAT PRICE GLORY" AT THE GARRICK FOR ANOTHER WEEK

"What Price Glory" the war play which created such a sensation in New York when it hit Broadway a year ago, will be the attraction at the Garrick Theatre, Detroit.

No play of modern times has created so much discussion or had so strong a masculine appeal as this "bally comedy" of the war.

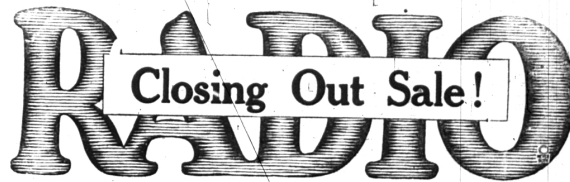
