98—Moved by Commissioner Ladd that the following preamble and resolution be adopted:

Whereas March 29, 1926, was hereby fixed by this Commission as the time for the meeting to hear suggestions and objections to the installation of water main in Pierce Street from Lincoln Avenue to First Avenue, in the Village of Birmingham, and

Whereas due notice of the meeting has been given in the manner required by law to each person owning property liable for special assessment within a special assessment district established for such purpose and the Commission duly met on this 29th day of March, A. D. 1926, at 10 o'clock P. M. for the purpose aforesaid, and due hearing has been given to all persons making suggestions and objections to the proposed improvement, therefore,

Be it resolved that watermain be laid in Pierce Street from Lincoln Avenue to First Avenue in the Village of Birmingham, and

Be it further resolved that said special assessment district within said special assessment district be constituted Special Assessment District No. 72, upon the basis of the special assessment levied for the purpose of installing water main, according to an estimate heretofore prepared by the Village Manager and now on file with the Village Clerk, and

Be it further resolved that the Village of Birmingham shall pay the general fund the amount of \$264.00, being 1/4 of the cost of the watermain, and

Be it further resolved that the Assessors of the Village of Birmingham be and they are directed, in pursuance thereof, to make a special assessment levied for the purpose herein provided on all taxable lands and improvements within Special Assessment District No. 72, for the sum of \$2,186.00, aforementioned, to be paid to the Commission with all due haste.
