

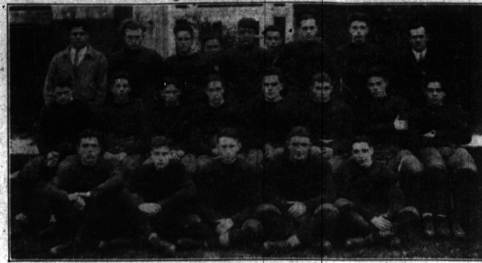

Uselfulness Is Stressed To Village Boys At Conference

Last Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Claude Streb, Morgan Carter, Bonner Waterman, Earl Schmitt and Harry Bradley attended the Michigan Twenty-fourth Annual Older Boys' Conference, at Jackson. Approximately 1600 boys, attended and all of them were taken into Jackson homes and made members of the family whom they stayed with over the week-end. No two boys from the same school were allowed to room together, but roomed with a boy he had never seen before. This was to make the boys meet more people and learn to talk with a stranger.

The theme of this year's conference was "My Life and the World's Needs." All of the meetings were opened with songs, which were led by Ted Evans of Detroit.

This singing was impressive for when 1600 boys sing out their thoughts, one can not help but see things which he sings about. The most popular song was "Follow the Gleam," while "Jesus Calls Us," and "Where He Leads Me," were close seconds. A devotional period followed during which many of the boys offered prayers.

Our first address was given by Dean Graham of Oberlin College. In his address "The World of Youth," he compares the chances that the youth of our generation has with that of our parents and showed us how much better chances we have to succeed than they. He also spoke of world brotherhood, saying that we should try to help foreigners and colored people to succeed and not be as selfish.

Following this address were discussion groups in which our group discussed the racial problem very thoroughly. After supper greetings were offered by two prominent business men of Jackson and Dr. Taylor of Boston presented a speech on "Building a Life," which I think was the best address of the conference. He stated that one must have a firm foundation if he wishes to succeed and this foundation is religion. He al-

so told us that self control, patience, which he explained as meaning the ability to stick to a thing until it is carried out, godliness and unselfishness, were all qualities which were essential to success.

One of the points I remember came from a story he told us of a boy who had for his motto at college "I am third." This boy did not tell his classmates what it meant until he graduated. This was the explanation: when he left home his mother said to him, to put God first, others second, and himself third. He asked his chum if he had carried out his motto and his chum said that he had. It would really be a great thing if every boy would adopt this motto and carry it out.

Dean Graham gave the final two addresses. The first told of the danger of a person underestimating himself. In the second he said that a man without a college education can never reach the highest peak in life. He also described two men to us, both of them went through college and started into business. The first who was a selfish and liked to help others became a very powerful man, while the other who was just the opposite did not do so well and was not liked by people. Then he brought up a question which made us say that he would be that kind of a man who would help others instead of just doing things for one's own benefit.

Any boy who attends one of these conferences is sure to come back with new ideas and the time he spends at the conference will not be wasted. I am sure that any person who has been to a conference would advise other boys to go and would go again himself if he had the opportunity.

At a meeting of the Senior class Tuesday night it was decided to wear caps and gowns at graduation exercises next June. The class of 1927 is the first class since 1923 who have adopted this plan and they are thoroughly convinced that caps and gowns are the proper attire for graduating classes. The majority of the class voted for the plan, the vote being 43 to 7.
