OYSTERS SHOULD BE SERVED DISCREETLY

Housewives who strictly adhere to the custom of serving oysters only in the "R" months are including them in the menus. At all times of the year oysters should be wisely handled.

They are not an economical food and from the health standpoint they do not rank high. A large portion of the oyster consists of liver and this yields large quantities of uric acid.

Since oysters act as a medium for transmitting disease great care must be taken in avoiding contamination, not only during their growth but in the shipping and marketing. Hence, housewives should buy oysters from reliable dealers only.

Overcooking oysters makes them tough and indigestible. They should not reach the boiling point in cooking. They are most easily digested if eaten raw.

MENU HINT

A simple but sufficient and nourishing breakfast is necessary before starting work in snappy weather. Fresh fruit might be added to the menu printed below for the system. To cook the old-fashioned oatmeal or rolled oats mix one cup meal with four cups boiling water in the double boiler and cook one and one-half hours. The raisins may be added after the first half hour of cooking or just before serving. The cereal may be cooked the night before and warmed up in the double boiler at breakfast time.

Cooked Cereal with Raisins
French Omelet Toast
Marmalade Coffee

French Omelet—Four eggs, four tablespoons milk, one-half teaspoon salt, pepper to taste, two tablespoons butter. Beat eggs slightly, just enough to blend the yolks and whites, add the seasonings. Put butter in the hot pan and when melted turn in the mixture. As it cooks prick and pick up with a fork until the whole is of creamy consistency. Place on butter fire that it may brown quickly underneath. Fold and turn on hot platter.
